Announcement regarding the Indoor Member and Club Displays For our 2013 Show and Sale

Hi to all

I have returned from my lengthy road trip and am eager to continue the planning for our upcoming Show and Sale.

As has been announced before, there will be an indoor table for our members to display their favorite plant(s). Conveniently, the Plant of the Month is also "Your Favorite." After the meeting on Thursday, please leave your favorite plants so that we may display them over the weekend.

Additionally, the LACSS will design a Club Display of Cacti and Succulents with a specific Family to be represented.

For the **Cacti** the Family is obviously <u>Cactaceae</u>. Because that is a VERY large Family, we will narrow it down to <u>Small, Globular Cacti of South America</u>. This would include Gymocalycium, Echinopsis, Copiapoa, Discocactus, Ubelmannia, Eriosyce, Lobivia, Matucana, Neoporteria, Notocactus, Oroya, Parodia, Rebutia, Sulcorebutia, but not limited to those.

For the **Succulent** portion of our Club display, the Family will be <u>Mesembryanthemaceae</u> (hereinafter referred to as Mesembs), also a very large Family. There are more than 100 Genera with the more familiar being Conophytum, Delosperma, Faucaria, Lithops, Mesembs, Titanopsis, and Trichodiadema.

If you do not have a favorite plant but wish to participate in the Club display, please bring those plants to the Thursday meeting. There will be a short form available to fill out to describe your plant and to provide any other interesting information about the plant (age, cultivation needs, grown from seed, etc).

Walt and Maxine Wegner: Lifelong Partners, Lifetime Members, and Cactus Ramblers Nils Schirrmacher

PART 1

In December of 1975, the *Cactus Chronicle* welcomed Walt and Maxine Wegner as new members. The couple was part of a membership wave that occurred after the club changed its meeting location from Cal State College in Los Angeles proper, to the Naval Center in Encino. Meeting attendance more than doubled at the new suburban location.

Soon after joining, The Wegners became active Plant of the Month participants. Walt remembers the embarrassment of Ed Gay making one of his early entries, an example of mealy bug infestation. In spite of this beginner's blunder, he and Maxine rose smoothly through the POM ranks, exhibiting in the Master class by 1983.

The couple traded their POM experience for ribbons at the annual club show—then held at the Topanga Plaza and Panorama City Mall—and the Arboretum's Inter-City Show. As Walt and Maxine graduated from being show participants to event judges and organizers, they also took on the responsibility of several LACSS offices. Maxine served as Secretary from 1980-81; and Walt, Treasurer from 1978-80, and President for the years of 1984-86. The highlight of Walt's presidency was the club's 50th Anniversary, celebrated with a banquet at the Braemar Country Club in Tarzana.

If these contributions weren't enough, Walt proved himself tireless with an eleven-year stint as *Chronicle* editor. From 1984-95 he worked alongside POM scribe Betty Gay to keep members informed and educated. His editorship saw the *Chronicle* weaned off the typewriter and on to the home computer.

Mr. Wegner's interest in cacti and succulents began as a boy. Upon hearing his father refer to an agave as a Century Plant, Walt's curiosity was piqued. This interest turned to wonder as the senior Wegner described the plant's mythic, 100-year bloom. The boy's regard for horticulture continued to be nurtured during vacations on his grandparent's Oregon farm.

Although his green thumb developed early, an historic event prevented Walt from tending a garden of his own. The onset of World War II found him enlisting in the Air Force, where he served as navigator on B17 and B29 bombers. After the war, Walt continued his military service, dedicating twenty-four years to the USAF.

Equally historic was Walt's marriage to Maxine. In November of 1945, Walt was a seasoned flyer with 51 missions under his belt, but still too young to marry without his parent's consent. Before the couple could tie the knot, he required his mother's signature, a legality that has been the source of much ribbing from Maxine.

Walt's military career kept the newlyweds on the move, occupying 14 houses in five states,



and a residence in Spain. It wasn't until Walt's retirement in 1967 that the couple settled into their Woodland Hills home, allowing their enthusiasm for plants thick and thorny to finally take root.

After their home and club affiliations had been established, the couple embarked on excursions through Baja. Walt attributes the success of their trips to the dependability of the AAA Guidebook, his Isuzu pickup, and Mexico's chain of *El Presidente* hotels. With the location of each hotel listed in the guide, the Wegners hopscotched down the peninsula, planning a half-day of sightseeing followed by a half-day of travel to the next *Presidente*. Their trips culminated with the purchase of a time-share at the Finisterra

Included here are images from an excursion made in 1985. These photogenic cacti, palms, and pachycauls are meant to inspire a new generation of Baja ramblers, easing 21st Century cares under the same deep blue sky.
